Chair & Director's Message

It is with pleasure that we share with you the achievements of Te Waka Huia O Te Taua Moana o Aotearoa, the National Museum of the Royal New Zealand Navy in 2022/23. The Museum is uniquely placed to support the Navy and New Zealand Defence Force, as we strive to achieve our purpose as the engaging, inspiring and enduring heart of the Navy memories and stories past present and future.

The Museum welcomed 85,517 visitors, an increase of 44% on the previous year, underlining its importance as a place of memory, learning and connection to a wide range of communities, particularly Navy personnel serving and retired. Overcoming challenges such as the Auckland Anniversary floods, the Museum team continued to deliver an outstanding customer experience as reflected in 100% visitor satisfaction rating.

A strategic focus is building awareness of Navy and NZDF through the Museum's Learning and Education Strategy. The Museum made a substantial step in 2022/23 by introducing the first School Kit for Navy to Aotearoa. 'Bomb Gone!' was used in 495 classrooms nationwide, reaching 20,000 + students, increasing their understanding of Navy's role in Aotearoa New Zealand history.

Engaging with Navy veterans and sharing stories of those who have served is a strategic priority. The Threads Through Time project was an exemplar of this, enabling 12 retired and serving female personnel to share their experiences of serving in the - Navy since the 1960s. A unique textiles project spanning almost two years, the resulting exhibition attracted over 24,902 visitors.

The Museum was delighted to host the ground-breaking photographic exhibition Rainbow Warriors, featuring stories of 25 LGBTTIQA+ personnel, and recognising NZDF's journey to becoming a world leader in military inclusion. It was particularly well-received by our wider community and is an example of the museum enhancing the reputation of Navy and NZDF.

The Museum also made a significant contribution to the Navy's domestic engagement strategy throughout the

period with 174 events functions and visits. The Museum website and social media campaigns have continued to deliver increased engagement, taking stories of Navy across Aotearoa and beyond.

Researching, collecting and caring for the tangible and intangible heritage of the Navy is at the heart of the Museum's existence. Accessions into the collection exceeded 1500 items in 2022-23, and a wide range of research requests were completed. A highlight of this year has been the provision of objects and images to other organisations, including veteran groups, ships and other museums.

The Board's greatest focus has been on the museum's fourth strategic goal; Equipped to Serve. Our aim is to ensure the museum operates credibly within the national heritage sector, and it is able to exert strategic effect in support of Navy and NZDF's efforts. To this end, the Board continues to work with its partner, Navy, in making the case for an appropriate level of resource to deliver on the strategic plan. Meanwhile, the museum team has made tremendous progress on sustainability and other areas. Dialogue with the other service museums has also been a priority and, to this end, we would like to acknowledge the work of the National Army Museum, the Air Force Museum of New Zealand and their Boards.

The Board pursued opportunities to increase revenue, most notably through the introduction of an entry charge for adult international visitor. The financial position at the end of 2022-23 is a positive one, and we thank the Museum Director for working closely with the Board to deliver this outcome.

The Trust Board acknowledges the support from the Navy throughout the year and in particular the relationship with the Chief and Deputy Chief of Navy. We would like to commend the efforts of the Board of the National Museum of the Royal New Zealand and our dedicated team of Museum professionals, in ensuring the Museum's success over the last 12 months.

The strong partnership between the Navy Museum and the Royal New Zealand Navy delivers sustainable internal and external benefits for both parties.

The New Zealand Defence Force, through the Royal New Zealand Navy (Navy) has remained the Board's principal partner in the operation of the Navy Museum. In addition to contributing in the order of \$1,805,511 funding providing for both personnel and the Museum's annual operating budget. The Navy also provided substantial functional support essential to the effective operation of the Museum.

The Navy continued to provide essential additional personnel to supplement the small Museum staff,

enabling progress to be made on a number of initiatives that otherwise would not have been possible.

Through Naval Heritage learning sessions, Navy Museum educators guide sailors to engage with Navy history and traditions. From new entrant Junior Officers and Basic Common Trainees, to mid-career Leading Hands and Petty Officers, sailors make meaningful connections to the Navy past, present and future.

Strategic Goal One

Being Essential to Te Taua Moana O Aotearoa

Playing a unique and critical role as the cultural epicentre within the Navy.

We've...

- Enabled over 24,902 members of our community to reflect, create and connect through our Threads Through Time Exhibition and associated workshops.
- Engaged personnel and our wider community with Anzac Day through our traditional poppy making activity in the museum and at the Vince McGlone Galley.
- Helped raise awareness of NZDFs journey from exclusion to becoming a world leader in military LBTTIQA+ inclusion with the hosting of the Rainbow Warriors exhibition uncovering the stories of 25 LBTTIQA+ personnel.
- Provided 2,202 hours of Navy heritage engagement.
- Engaged over 900 NZDF personnel with their Naval heritage.
- Organically rebuilt our visitor numbers to 85,517 post Covid-19 pandemic and the Auckland Anniversary floods.

Strategic Goal Two

Building Awareness and Understanding

Being a platform that connects, educates and engages people with the Navy.

We've...

- **Welcomed 1,269,104 visitors** to the Navy Museum since opening at Torpedo Bay.
- **Received a 100% of visit recommendation** from our visitors.
- **Delivered 532 guided tours** to 2,268 visitors.
- **Employed two, two-year fixed-term educators** to develop and drive the Learning and Education Strategy including the creation and delivery of new on and off-site learning programmes.
- **Engaged 10,310 school students** in learning programmes.
- **Connected 481 classroom teachers** across the country with RNZN history through our learning resource, Bomb Gone Steering Our Own Course.
- **Launched the Threads Through Time exhibition** showcasing the 49 square quilt created from decommissioned re-purposed naval uniforms by 12 serving and retired female sailors.
- **Hosted several workshops** building on the Threads Through Time exhibition including Stitch a Story for

children and several Stitch and Relax sessions with master embroiderer Lynn Smart.

- **Worked with the Women's Royal New Zealand Naval Association** to deliver a new permanent exhibition recognising the contribution of women in the Navy from 1942 - 1977: Breaking Down Barriers.
- **Collaborated with Seonaid Harvey** from Auckland Libraries to deliver an introduction to Genealogy workshop for our community.
- **Engaged our wider community with NZDF's Journey** from exclusion to LGBTTIQA+ inclusion through the Rainbow Warriors photographic exhibition.
- **Held community engagement workshops** focused on 'Writing Your Family Stories' with Lynn Dawson.
- **Collaborated with Navy** on the delivery of Navigating with the Navy Workshop engaging our community both with naval personnel and with how the Navy navigates.
- **Worked with the Pacifica Arts Centre** to engage our community with the art of Tivaevae.
- **Seen a 44% increase in participation** in our school holiday programme activities with 3,372 taking part during the year.

Strategic Goal Three

Caring for Collections and Knowledge

Researching, collecting and caring for the tangible and intangible heritage of the Navy past, present and future.

We've...

- Added 485 new objects to the Collection.
- Updated 2151 database records including 1164 photographs and 987 objects.
- Answered 544 research requests internal and external.
- Acquired a number of notable items to the Collection including: 15 original hand-drawn cartoons by 'Inky' McNicol, a grave marker commemorating sailors from HMS Hazard who died in the 1845 sacking of Kororāreka and a Naval Artillery Volunteers Sword.
- Successfully prepared and installed various artefacts for the WRNZNS: Breaking Down Barriers exhibition and developed the content for an online Coronation exhibition.
- Installed 12 additional medal sets into the medal drawers and written and uploaded the biographies onto the medal database/website.
- Collaborated with Te Taua Moana Marae to catalogue and photograph the Marae's Taonga.
- Provided significant assistance, including photographing multiple items to Barry O'Sullivan for his publication on New Zealand Naval uniforms.
- Organised the loan of two Colin Wynn paintings to Academy of Fine Arts, Wellington for Coronation exhibition.
- Successfully rationalised the Hire Collection — including checking and assessing all items for retention or disposal.
- Deaccessioned with Board approval, 304 library books, Horner Collection, Nelson Booklet and a collection of drill rifles.
- Provided 1183 negatives in response to requests — 54% to the public and 46% within New Zealand Defence Force.
- Digitised 723 negatives/prints.
- Provided images for internal and external parties; — of particular significance were images supplied for: HMS Tamaki, Mururoa Veterans, Hydrographic and Medic Trade Reunions, Barry O'Sullivan Naval Uniform publication, Operation Grapple exhibition at MTG Hawke's Bay and WRNZNS Breaking Down Barriers exhibition.
- Hosted 21 visits to the Collections Store.
- Completed the clothing project including all items fully inventoried and Tyvek uniform bags manufactured.

Strategic Goal Four

Equipped to Serve

Ensuring a sustainable, resilient organisation with funding people capability and ways of working that enables the responsive and high performing cultural institution.

We've...

- **Recognised the heroism of Front of House team members:** Euan Blake, Roger Martin and LMus Michael Jamieson with the award of a Deputy Chief of Navy Commendation for their efforts in rescuing an elderly man from the sea.
- **Successfully introduced** a \$10 charge for international visitors aged 18+.
- **Seen a 350% increase in donations** thanks to the continued efforts of our Front of House Team.
- **Introduced a museum-wide sustainability strategy** including auditing our carbon footprint.
- **Collaborated with ecological-community group** Restoring Takarunga Hauraki to reduce the rat population on Maungauika and the surrounding area by managing rat traps around the museum perimeter.
- **Hosted 88 groups** in the Museum's conference facilities.
- **Collaborated with Navy to deliver 47 NZDF and NZDF adjacent events** including attestations, medal

ceremonies, promotions, Navy Museum Trust Board events, Navy Museum exhibition launches, Navy Reunions and Memorials, community group events and VIP visits.

- **Upgraded the power supply** to the Museum reducing power cuts and spiking.
- **Completed repairs to galleries** caused by flooding from extreme weather events and steps have been taken to mitigate future weather related risks.
- **Upgraded the lighting** in our learning space, Tūhura enabling community engagement workshops to be held in this space.

Special Project

Threads Through Time

Threads Through Time started as an idea for upcycling and repurposing old Navy uniforms and quickly grew into a unique textiles project spanning 21 months, culminating in an exhibition.

Created by 12 retired and serving female naval personnel the women created 49 separate squares, handcrafted from a variety of old uniform fabrics worn by naval personnel: jackets, trousers, dresses, shirts and braid, buttons and badges. The squares were then sewn together to create an incredible quilt.

The squares told the stories of each woman's experience serving in the New Zealand Navy since the 1960s. Sewn together, they symbolised the sustainability of military service and created a greater understanding of a shared culture and heritage.

The exhibition was supported by themed stitching workshops for children along with Stitch with a Sailor sessions for the public to meet and create alongside the Threads Through Time participants. These workshops were then extended through several Stitch and Relax sessions.

Threads Through Time demonstrated the strength of the Navy Museum to bring people together to reflect,

create and connect. The exhibition ran from October 2022 through April 2023, with 24,902 people visiting the exhibition during that time.

Mururoa – 50 Years On

Fifty years have passed since HMNZS Otago and Canterbury were sent to Mururoa Atoll to protest the atmospheric nuclear testing conducted by France.

In August the Mururoa Nuclear Veterans Group gathered at the Navy Museum for the anniversary commemorations. At the commemoration event, the Navy Museum unveiled a new display of the New Zealand Special Service Medal (Nuclear Testing), which was awarded to personnel who were part of an official presence at atmospheric nuclear tests between 1956 and 1973.

Mururoa veterans and family who attended the event left personal reminiscences on a Wall of Memories in the Atrium gallery.

“My father served on the Canterbury proud and grateful for his service. I loved to listen to him talk about his time in the Navy and the adventures he had. Meeting his shipmates is like having a whole lot of uncles. Bless them all. Rest Easy Dad. We have the watch.”

Bomb Gone – Engaging with Schools

Navy Museum collections were delivered to schools nationwide through *Bomb Gone! Steering our own Course*, a resource developed in collaboration with School Kit.

This learning resource, which comprised replica artefacts complimented by an online resource, provided teachers and learners with an engaging and unique unit of work aligned with the new Aotearoa New Zealand Histories curriculum.

Using Bomb Gone!, students explored New Zealand's journey to nuclear free, from the Navy's involvement at Operation Grapple, to the protests of French nuclear testing at Mururoa Atoll, to the sinking of the Rainbow Warrior. In total the kit has been used in 495 classrooms nationwide. In feedback about Bomb Gone!...

- 90% rated the kit as effective or highly effective in building awareness of the Navy's role in Aotearoa New Zealand history
- 83% of teachers rated their knowledge of the topic as low or very low prior to the kit, converting to 90% of teachers rated their knowledge of the topic as high or very high after using the kit.
